2024 Municipal Election

Voting in the Election

Qualifications to Vote:

- You must be 18 years or older on the day of Advance Polling (October 10th, 2024).
- You must be a Canadian citizen on the day of Advance Polling (October 10th, 2024).
- You must be a resident of Victoria County for at least six (6) months preceding the day of Advance Polling.
- Election Day is October 19th, 2024.
- Eligible residents will elect one councillor to represent their district for the next four (4) years. There are eight (8) districts in Victoria County.
- Voting will be done electronically. More information on electronic voting will be forthcoming.
- You can cast your vote electronically beginning on October 10th at 9:00 a.m. Voting closes at 7:00 p.m. on October 19th.

Thinking of running for Council?

Overview of the Process:

- Check if you meet the qualifications.
- Contact the Returning Officer to receive the information you'll need to run.
- Read the Candidate's Guide.
- Start Campaigning.
- Complete the Nomination Paperwork and submit it by 5:00 p.m. on Nomination Day (September 10th, 2024).
- Pay the \$200 deposit.
- File all other required forms by the due dates.

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2024-2025 Municipal Grants

Every year, Victoria County funds community groups and organizations to support the important work they do for residents and initiatives in the Municipality. In 2024 – 2025, the Municipality is providing \$356,015 to a variety of non-profit organizations. Bras d'Or Lakes Collaborative Environmental Planning Initiative (CEPI) - \$2,500 from Victoria County

Keeping the beautiful waters of the Bras d'Or Lake healthy and vibrant needs oversight and management. The Collaborative Environmental Planning Initiative (CEPI) does that by working together with the federal, provincial, municipal and First Nation governments. It was started in response to a call to action by the Cape

Breton First Nations Chiefs more than 30 years ago and continues today. It's role now is more hands on, using education programs, community engagement and active environmental monitoring.

CEPI Coordinator Stan Johnson says continuing support is crucial to continue protecting these waters.

"We're not only protecting these waters; we're also safeguarding a way of life for all those who live, work and use its water for recreation. We want to make sure the lake remains healthy for generations to come."

Inverness-Victoria Federation of Agriculture - \$3,000 from Victoria County

If you're a farmer in Victoria County and you need to bring in your hay or are in need of other machinery for temporary use, this is a non-profit group that may loan the necessary equipment to you.



Farm equipment, like a hay bailer, are available through the rental program.



The Machinery Rental Program currently rents equipment to approximately 60 farmers and now is extending equipment rental to available safety gear. Adding the safety gear (such as guards, safety chains, hitch pins, etc.) to this program will reduce accidents and unnecessary injury/death from preventable situations. In addition, monies will be used for computer & software upgrades that will help the non-profit group modernize to further streamline the rental program.

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Public Works

Light bulbs can now be recycled!

As of August 1st, 2024, you can now bring your lightbulbs to the Baddeck or Dingwall Transfer Station for recycling, rather than disposal. This new stewardship program is run by ProductCare Recyling who operates the disposal program.

There are a variety of lightbulbs that can be recycled, but it's important to note which bulbs cannot be recycled.

Accepted:

- Fluorescent tubes
- Halogen and incandescent bulbs
- ✓ LEDs
- UV and germicidal bulbs
- Miniature bulbs
- High-intensity discharge (HID) and special purpose bulbs

Not Accepted:

- Bike lights
- Ceiling fixtures
- Chandeliers
- Flashlights
- Floor lamps
- Lights strings (e.g. Christmas lights)
- Outdoor fixtures
- Recessed/pot lights

Pressure Treated Wood Disposal Ban

On July 5th, 2024, a province-wide ban of treated wood being disposed of in Construction & Demolition (C&D) went into effect at Nova Scotia Waste Management Sites. This means that unless the municipality has C&D sites that can properly dispose of pressure treated wood, it will not be accepted for disposal. In Victoria County, treated wood will be transported to the Guysborough Waste Management Facility which is the closest site with proper disposal facilities for chemically treated wood.

When the C&D disposal cell was designed for our county, it was not built to the specifications of the new provincial requirements; however, our Waste Management Facility in Baddeck and Dingwall will continue to accept this material and will ship it to the Guysborough Waste Management Facility , where it can be properly disposed of. As this involves additional

transportation, a tipping fee is now applied for providing this service. You can also choose to transport the material yourself to the Guysborough Waste Management Facility. Please note that all vehicles larger than 1 ton must haul treated wood directly to the Guysborough Waste Management Facility for disposal.

Divert NS, the Nova Scotia not-for-profit corporation that manages the Beverage Container Deposit-Refund Program and the Tire Recycling program, recognizes innovative businesses, institutions, communities and leaders in waste management. This year, a restaurant in North River Bridge in Victoria County has been nominated in the Small Business category for its efforts to implement environmentally aware practices through recycling, diversion, and waste reduction.

Chanterelle Inn and Cottages, now under new ownership of Bettina and Holger Hartenstein, actively works to produce as little waste as possible. They try to divert much of what they use in the kitchen, including making soap from the spent cooking oil, with future plans for even more innovative diversion efforts.

Active Living & Recreation Courage to Take the First Step — Recreation Equipment Loan Program in the Community

Barb Keylor, a Ross Ferry resident, was persuaded by her good friend and neighbour Nancy Cronin to attend a "Lunch and Learn" Session in Baddeck featuring Victoria County's Active Living & Recreation Coordinator, Christopher Woodford demonstrating new equipment for loan through Victoria County.

Chris demonstrated different types of equipment that will be avail-

able through the Recreation Equipment Loan Program. Through not-for-profit organizations, various recreation equipment will be available for loan. One of those items up for loan will be walking poles.

If Barb Keylor hadn't had the opportunity to try poles out, she's not sure she would have taken them up on her own. Barb had been having difficulties with mobility and at the "Lunch and Learn" she gave them a try. Her friend Nancy suggested that if Barb were to borrow a pair, Nancy would help her get started.


As Barb recalls, "When Nancy came over, this is God's truth. You see that trailer over there? I couldn't walk over there without stopping to catch my breath. It was terrible."

First, Nancy started assisting Barb with the poles, as they began walking very short distances. Initially, Barb had to stop frequently, but Nancy was patient and encouraging.

They gradually increased their distance, first to the end of the driveway and back, then to the neighbour's driveway and back. One day, Barb suggested they go further. Over 12 weeks or so, they eventually reached 1.6 kilometers, with Barb needing to stop for breaks along the way.

Barb is thrilled with her progress, saying people noticed, commenting to her, "I didn't know you were that tall!"

Using the poles to support and provide her balance, not only helped her posture, but it also improved her mental and physical health. Although it required steady effort, she says it's had a huge impact on her well-being.



It gave her the confidence to start going out and attending events again, despite ongoing health challenges. She had previously relied on a walker and avoided going out.

Barb is grateful to the program and to her good friend, Nancy, for helping her face and conquer this challenge.

"Nancy has been a godsend, not just to me but for the entire community," Barb said, grateful for the support and encouragement that has made such a positive impact on her life.
